Banana River Habitat Rehabilitation Project

1. DESCRIPTION

The City of Cape Canaveral's proposal for the habitat rehabilitation of the western-end section of Long Point Road shoreline of the Banana River Aquatic Preserve was approved by the ASA(CW) in April 2007. The project site is a 7.9 acres natural area owned by the City and includes 4.8 acres of forested wetlands and 3.1 acres of mangrove swamp. The project site is one of the last natural habitat areas within the City limits. The project purpose is to restore the property to its native habitat to provide critical habitat for bird and animal species. Restoration will be achieved by the control of invasive plants that have overgrown within the forested wetlands and mangrove swamp habitats and by planting of native slash pine trees and mangroves. The restoration will help improve the quality of water within the project site by eliminating sources of nitrogen, phosphorous, and vegetative debris from invasive plants
