FLORIDA COASTAL ZONE MANAGEMENT PROGRAM FEDERAL CONSISTENCY EVALUATION PROCEDURES

JACKSONVILLE HARBOR (MILE POINT) NAVIGATION STUDY

1. Chapter 161, Beach and Shore Preservation. The intent of the coastal construction permit program established by this chapter is to regulate construction projects located seaward of the line of mean high water and which might have an effect on natural shoreline processes.

Response: The proposed plans and information will be voluntarily submitted to the state in compliance with this chapter.

2. Chapters 163(part II), 186, and 187, County, Municipal, State and Regional Planning. These chapters establish the Local Comprehensive Plans, the Strategic Regional Policy Plans, and the State Comprehensive Plan (SCP). The SCP sets goals that articulate a strategic vision of the state's future. It's purpose is to define in a broad sense, goals, and policies that provide decision-makers directions for the future and provide long-range guidance for an orderly social, economic and physical growth.

Response: The proposed project shall be coordinated with various federal, state and local agencies during the planning process. The project meets the primary goal of the State Comprehensive Plan through preservation and protection of the shorefront development and infrastructure.

3. Chapter 252, Disaster Preparation, Response and Mitigation. This chapter creates a state emergency management agency, with the authority to provide for the common defense; to protect the public peace, health and safety; and to preserve the lives and property of the people of Florida.

Response: The proposed project would provide safer navigation conditions as well as reduce erosion along Mile Point. Therefore, this project would be consistent with the efforts of Division of Emergency Management.

4. Chapter 253, State Lands. This chapter governs the management of submerged state lands and resources within state lands. This includes archeological and historical resources; water resources; fish and wildlife resources; beaches and dunes; submerged grass beds and other benthic communities; swamps, marshes and other wetlands; mineral resources; unique natural features; submerged lands; spoil islands; and artificial reefs.

Response: The proposed project would comply with state regulations pertaining to the above resources. Impacts to marshes would be mitigated and fully coordinated with the state. The work would comply with the intent of this chapter.

5. Chapters 253, 259, 260, and 375, Land Acquisition. This chapter authorizes the state to acquire land to protect environmentally sensitive areas.

Response: Since the affected property already is in public ownership or is under an easement for public placement use, this chapter does not apply.

6. Chapter 258, State Parks and Aquatic Preserves. This chapter authorizes the state to manage state parks and preserves. Consistency with this statute would include consideration of projects that would directly or indirectly adversely impact park property, natural resources, park programs, management or operations.

Response: The proposed project shall be coordinated with the state of Florida regarding project activities in the vicinity of the Nassau River-St. Johns River Marshes Aquatic Preserve. The project shall be consistent with this chapter.

7. Chapter 267, Historic Preservation. This chapter establishes the procedures for implementing the Florida Historic Resources Act responsibilities.

Response: This project shall be coordinated with the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO). Surveys shall be conducted in order to determine the presence of historic properties. The project will be consistent with this chapter.

8. Chapter 288, Economic Development and Tourism. This chapter directs the state to provide guidance and promotion of beneficial development through encouraging economic diversification and promoting tourism.

Response: The proposed work would encourage commercial and recreational use which in turn would provide economic benefits to the area. This would be compatible with tourism for this area and therefore, is consistent with the goals of this chapter.

9. Chapters 334 and 339, Transportation. This chapter authorizes the planning and development of a safe balanced and efficient transportation system.

Response: No public transportation systems would be impacted by this project.

10. Chapter 370, Saltwater Living Resources. This chapter directs the state to preserve, manage and protect the marine, crustacean, shell and anadromous fishery resources in state waters; to protect and enhance the marine and estuarine environment; to regulate fishermen and vessels of the state engaged in the taking of such resources within or without state waters; to issue licenses for the taking and processing products of fisheries; to secure and maintain statistical records of the catch of each such species; and, to conduct scientific, economic, and other studies and research.

Response: The proposed work would impact salt marsh, and these impacts shall be offset by performing adequate mitigation. Benthic organisms may also be adversely affected by the work, but should recover. The project footprint is relatively small and lies adjacent to similar habitat which should accelerate benthic recolonization. Therefore, substantial impacts to the aquatic ecosystem are not anticipated. Based on the overall impacts of the project, the project is consistent with the goals of this chapter.

11. Chapter 372, Living Land and Freshwater Resources. This chapter establishes the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission and directs it to manage freshwater aquatic life and wild animal life and their habitat to perpetuate a diversity of species with densities and distributions which provide sustained ecological, recreational, scientific, educational, aesthetic, and economic benefits.

Response: The project would not have a substantial adverse impact on living land and freshwater resources. Loss of upland habitat would be minimal.

12. Chapter 373, Water Resources. This chapter provides the authority to regulate the withdrawal, diversion, storage, and consumption of water.

Response: This project does not involve water resources as described by this chapter.

13. Chapter 376, Pollutant Spill Prevention and Control. This chapter regulates the transfer, storage, and transportation of pollutants and the cleanup of pollutant discharges.

Response: The contract specifications will prohibit the contractor from dumping oil, fuel, or hazardous wastes in the work area and will require that the contractor adopt safe and sanitary measures for the disposal of solid wastes. A spill prevention plan will be required.

14. Chapter 377, Oil and Gas Exploration and Production. This chapter authorizes the regulation of all phases of exploration, drilling, and production of oil, gas, and other petroleum products.

Response: This project does not involve the exploration, drilling or production of gas, oil or petroleum product and therefore, this chapter does not apply.

15. Chapter 380, Environmental Land and Water Management. This chapter establishes criteria and procedures to assure that local land development decisions consider the regional impact nature of proposed large-scale development. This chapter also deals with the Area of Critical State Concern program and the Coastal Infrastructure Policy.

Response: The proposed work shall be coordinated with the local regional planning commission. Therefore, the project shall be consistent with the goals of this chapter.

16. Chapters 381 (selected subsections on on-site sewage treatment and disposal systems) and 388 (Mosquito/Arthropod Control). Chapter 388 provides for a comprehensive approach for abatement or suppression of mosquitoes and other pest arthropods within the state.

Response: The project shall not further the propagation of mosquitoes or other pest arthropods.

17. Chapter 403, Environmental Control. This chapter authorizes the regulation of pollution of the air and waters of the state by the Florida Department of Environmental Regulation (now a part of the Florida Department of Environmental Protection).

Response: An Environmental Assessment addressing project impacts has been prepared and will be reviewed by the appropriate resource agencies including the Florida Department of Environmental Protection. Environmental protection measures will be implemented to ensure that no lasting adverse effects on water quality, air quality, or other environmental resources will occur. Water Quality Certification will be sought from the state prior to construction. The project complies with the intent of this chapter.

18. Chapter 582, Soil and Water Conservation. This chapter establishes policy for the conservation of the state soil and water through the Department of Agriculture. Land use policies will be evaluated in terms of their tendency to cause or contribute to soil erosion or to conserve, develop, and utilize soil and water resources both onsite or in adjoining properties affected by the project. Particular attention will be given to projects on or near agricultural lands.

Response: The proposed project is not located near or on agricultural lands; therefore, this chapter does not apply.

Subject: Mile Point Project concerns

Good morning Chris. This morning I received a forwarded copy of the email you sent out requesting that Chamber members contact the Corps of Engineers in support of the Milepoint Project. I'd like you to know upfront that my family and I are in full support of the project, and realize the potential positive economic impact this project could provide for Jacksonville....and Lord knows we need it.

Although I support this project, I also have concerns about the project as a property owner who resides on Greenfield Creek. As you may know, the project includes plans for a new access channel for the Greenfield /

Mt Pleasant Creeks and the Spanish Point area. The plan provides for no maintenance of the channel after the construction and dredging have been completed. The area that the channel is proposed for was formerly the access channel for our waterways. However, it filled in over the years, so there is a history of silting for this area.

Currently we have a channel that allows us access to the Intracoastal Waterway at all hours of the day regardless of the tide. The stated depth of the new channel is 6ft. Our average tidal change in this area is 4.5 - 5ft. During new moon periods in the Fall and Spring seasons we experience tidal movement of more than 6ft, which raises some access questions for me. As waterfront residents, we'd like some assurance that we will not be faced with extended periods of inaccessability during construction. As of yet the Corps has not been able to give us this assurance.

Our requests, as affected residents, are simple -- we'd like to respectfully request that language be written into the project that would require maintenance of the access channel be the responsibility of the Corps of Engineers for the life of the channel going forward.

Again Chris, I offer my support for the Milepoint Project, but as it's written right now, there is the real potential for these waterfront residents, like myself, to be left with an enormous dredging bill that we could never reasonably afford.

Thanks for your time this morning. I'd look forward to hearing your thoughts on these issues.

I live on Mt.Pleasant Creek, so have a vested interest to changes you propose to Mile Point, and the breach in Great Marsh Island. The breach occured when the Mile Point training wall failed, allowing water to come at Gteat Marsh Island directly from a NorthEast direction. This caused the entire South side behind Great Marsh Island to fill in with sand, mostly washed away from the East bank of Great Marsh Island. Today the best deepest water we have to exit Chicopit Creek is through the South end of the breach, as the Southside of the island is not navigatible, even at high tide. The Corps proposal to close the breach, and dig, (BUT NOT MAINTAIN.) a channel through the sand that has filled Chicopit Bay does not seem to be a solution that will work. The huge volumn of sand that has filled the bay will only fill the channel, leaving us no exit from our homes to the maintained navigational systems. Previous "Model Failures", most notibly the Mill Cove "Model", that determined that removing the training walls and digging a channel through this previously pristine waterway would restore the waterway to its previous deep water.

Today, more that 10 years later, the challel has disappeared, and Mill Cove remains a mudhole! I would think a more pratical solution for Chicopit Bay would be to use the natural breach channel as a guide, and build your wetlands with a bulkheaded channel where nature told you to build it. The filling in on each side of the Natural Channel would force water flow through that area, keeping it deep. The digging of an unnatural channel through a bay now filled with shifting sand will not work, as it will fill in as fast as you did it. Unless you plan to maintain it, don't dig a channel where 'Mother Nature" tells you she does not

want it.
