



## Exige compensación por abusos sexuales

**BERLÍN** —(AP)— Un alemán que dice un sacerdote católico abusó sexualmente de él cuando era monaguillo le envió una carta al papa Benedicto XVI pidiendo una "alta" compensación financiera por parte de la Iglesia. Wilfried Fesselmann dijo a The Associated Press que ha demandado además una disculpa del Papa y solicitado una audiencia personal en el Vaticano. Fesselmann dijo que envió la carta ayer. El hombre pidió una suma no especificada como compensación, diciendo que el abuso ocurrido hace tres decenios lo traumatizó tan gravemente que no pudo trabajar durante años.

## Reunión de Premios Nobel

**WASHINGTON** —(AP)— El presidente Barack Obama y Elie Wiesel, ambos Premios Nobel de la Paz, debatieron ayer la necesidad de reanudar el proceso de paz para el Oriente Medio, durante un almuerzo privado en la Casa Blanca. En un diálogo posterior con la Prensa, Wiesel dijo que la reunión fue un encuentro entre amigos. Pero agregó que la conversación se tornó seria al debatir los intentos de Estados Unidos por superar el estancamiento en el proceso de paz entre israelíes y palestinos. La reunión de Obama con Wiesel, firme partidario de Israel, se produce en momentos de relaciones tensas entre Estados Unidos e Israel. Aunque el autor opinó que las tensiones entre ambos países han disminuido.

**LA PAZ** —(AP)— Ladrones de autos robaron un vehículo del servicio doméstico del presidente Evo Morales en momentos en que el chofer compraba pan para el desayuno, informó la Policía. "No es un problema de seguridad sino un descuido del chofer", explicó ayer a periodistas el Jefe de la Policía contra el robo de vehículos, coronel Julio Cepcel. Ocurrió el domingo a las 6 de la mañana cuando el chofer fue a comprar en una Toyota Land Cruiser a un popular mercado en el centro de La Paz y tuvo que abandonar el coche "cinco minutos" para buscar una venta de pan.

# Inicia violento el fin de semana

■ Mujer de 31 años entre las víctimas.

**LOÍZA** – Una mujer de 31 años fue asesinada a balazos en el sector Villa Cañona II a eso de las 7:40 de la noche del jueves, y unas dos horas después un hombre fue asesinado en Hato Rey; la ola de violencia continuó con el asesinato de un individuo en la mañana de ayer en Bayamón y otro en Río Grande cerca del mediodía.

También se informó ayer del deceso de un individuo que había resultado herido de bala en la cabeza el pasado miércoles en Coamo, lo que elevó el número de asesinatos a 305, un aumento de 11 en comparación con el 2009.

En el primero de los casos la víctima fue identificada como Jazmín López de Jesús, a quien un individuo le disparó en la cabeza, cara, cuello y hombro. La pesquisa, en manos de la División de Homicidios del CIC de Carolina, apunta a que el motivo está relacionado al trasiego de drogas.

A eso de las 10:30 de la noche y en la calle Paraguay, en Hato Rey, fue asesinado José David Ríos Rivera, quien tenía 36 años. La víctima residía en la calle Los Ríos, en la barriada Jurutungo. Un pistolero lo acechó en un tramo de poca iluminación y le disparó en 17 ocasiones.

El cadáver baleado de un hombre, cuya identidad era desconocida, fue hallado a las 7:20 de la mañana de ayer en el sector Los Goveos, en el barrio Cerro Gordo, en Bayamón.

Cerca del mediodía y flotando en el sector La Poza, que ubica en la carretera PR-191, en el barrio Palmer, en Río Grande, fue hallado el cadáver de un hombre de unos 40 años, que tenía las manos atadas y heridas en el pecho y abdomen. Se desconocía la identidad del occiso.

El CIC de Aibonito se disponía a radicar cargos de asesinato contra un individuo que hirió el pasado miércoles a Alejandro Reyes Reyes, en el residencial Las Palmas, en Coamo. Reyes Reyes falleció el jueves en el Hospital San Cristóbal, en Ponce.
